## **Financial Aid**

□ Pay Enrollment and Housing Deposit: Make sure you have paid all deposits to
confirm your spot in college.
□ Complete Any Outstanding Financial Aid Verification: Do you have any
outstanding issues with financial aid that need to be addressed? If so, take care of those
as soon as possible so you can access your federal aid to pay for school.
□ Complete Entrance Counseling for Federal Loans: This is mandatory to receive
federal loans. Failing to do so will leave you unable to use these loans for college.
Complete the counseling carefully; this is important information about debt you are taking
on.
□ Address Financial Gap:
<ul> <li>Request Additional Aid: Your college may have additional aid available to assist you. Use SwiftStudent to complete a financial aid appeal, then submit the documents to your college's financial aid office. You can access the tool at <a href="https://formswift.com/swift-student">https://formswift.com/swift-student</a>.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Consider Lower Cost Alternatives: If your first option appears to still be too</li> </ul>
expensive consider other lower cost options. Millersville or HACC may be a good fit financially since they allow you to save money on housing.  Calculate Feasibility of Living at Home: Take into account any savings if you are able to live at home and don't have to pay for campus housing.
□ <b>Pay Tuition Bill:</b> Pay special attention to when your tuition bill arrives. There will
likely be a fairly quick turnaround to submit your payment. To pay for your courses you will need to have all your financial aid finalized and loan counseling completed.

[ a	Take Placement Test: If your college requires this, make sure you take it as soon possible so you can register for classes before they fill up. Take the test seriously and

	Purchase a Laptop and Supplies: A laptop, while expensive, is extremely
r	cessary for college classes. Regardless of the school you attend, it will be essential
r a b	completing your work. There are some low cost options, like Chromebooks. You don't do that MacBook pro unless you are in a program that specifically requires it. If you estruggling financially, contact your college, they may have loaner laptops you can row for a set period of time. Make sure to purchase whatever supplies you need for ur program and anything you need for your dorm if you're living on campus. 	Confirm Health Insurance: Most colleges and universities in the US require
c r	dents to have health insurance. If you are on your parents' plan, make sure it will ver you adequately at college (especially if you are traveling away for school). If this is an option for you, most campuses have to offer a healthcare package by law that u may purchase. Contact the health center to find out more.
	Get a Meningitis Shot (if living on campus): All colleges in Pennsylvania require
t	s by state law, and many other states do as well.
	Determine Transportation Plans:
	<ul> <li>Bus Pass: If you're staying local, explore different public transportation</li> </ul>
	options. Red Rose Transit offers transportation to HACC-Lancaster & MU; discounted bus passes are available at the HACC bookstore.

On Campus Parking: Explore your college's policies for on campus parking. Purchase a parking pass if you decide to bring a car to campus and your college allows it. Purchase Textbooks: Do this as soon as you're signed up for classes. Check your campus bookstore website for the list of books you will need for each course. DO NOT purchase your books from your college bookstore if you can avoid it. Consider the following cheaper options: **Rentals**: Great if you need them for a general education course not in your field of interest. Bookscouter.com allows you to see the cheapest rentals across all the largest textbook websites. Just make sure you return your books in time and in good condition, you don't want to get charged extra for them. Purchase Used: Use Bookscouter.com to find the cheapest textbooks available. Simply put in your ISBN code and it will show the prices for that textbook across all the largest used textbook websites, so you can quickly compare and save money. You can then use Bookscouter again at the end of the semester to sell those same books back to those same companies. Once You Get to College ☐ Get to Know Your Campus Resources: Colleges have a ton of resources, resources that YOU are paying for, so make the most of them! Academic Success Center: Sometimes known as the tutoring center, writing center etc., this facility should be your first stop when you are struggling in class or if you want help to turn in your very best work. This facility has adults and upperclassmen students who can tutor you in any academic area. It's usually free and is a fantastic way to receive help. Business Office: This is the place to go if you need to take care of any outstanding tuition payments or if you need to get reimbursed for anything. Career Services: These staff will help you prepare for life after college. Make sure you make multiple appointments annually, even if you do not know what you want to do after graduation. Your career adviser should help you understand job basics, like how to write a resume and how to ace an interview. Financial Aid Office: Even though you already filled out the FAFSA once, you will need to fill it out every year to receive financial aid. Stop in to meet your financial aid officer if you need help filling out your forms or have any questions about your aid package.

**Health Center**: This facility should be your first stop if you are feeling ill. Most colleges

have nurses, nurse practitioners, and doctors on staff. This facility should also have counseling services if you feel you need to talk to someone. Nearly 40% of students use counseling services at least once while in college, so don't be afraid to seek help if you

need it!

<ul> <li>Housing/Residential Office: If you need help with a housing or dormitory situation,</li> </ul>
check out this office. This is also important if you have roommate issues or something in
the residency is unsatisfactory.
Library: Don't be afraid of the library! Not only is it your #1 source for books when you have research papers to write, but it also has a ton of technology at your disposal (computers, printers, scanners, copiers, etc!) The library also has a variety of spaces for individual and group study so you have options to choose from. Most colleges also have a journal database so you can access millions of articles for your papers.
☐ <b>Mail Services:</b> Every student receives a mailbox on campus so make sure you know what your individual box # is and what your address is. You can also usually mail
your own things from this office.
□ Public Safety/Campus Police: Familiarize yourself with your campus security so that you can feel safe and secure walking around on campus. This may also be the location of your school's lost and found.
Student Affairs/Campus Life: In need of something to do after classes or on the weekends? Check out this office to find out all about the events happening on campus. Some require sign-ups so it is good to check in with this office so you are on top of what is available. Some events will require a fee, but most are free!
Study Abroad Office: Interested in going abroad? Usually colleges have a specific office designed to help students achieve this goal. It is important to head to this office a year before you want to leave for your country of choice so that you have plenty of time to prepare.
